Youth in our Church

My family joined the church in February of 1988. My father had just accepted the position of pastor of St. Paul's, and we moved from a small town in Pennsylvania to a small town in Maryland. Even though I cannot remember what the church was like when I was two years old, I can remember growing up in this church. I remember Sunday School, where each classroom had a teacher, and we were separated by age. Each year, we received a pin to mark our perfect attendance, and it was announced during the service. We had a substantial group of youth, and I remember going on trips to places such as Kings Dominion and Ocean City. We had lock-ins in the parish hall, caroling every December to the shut-ins, and Halloween parties (I still can't go into the parish hall basement because I'm too scared!). In middle school, we even had an afterschool youth program where the youth could hang out in the church's basement and bring their friends. The church was always a big part of my life, not just because my father was the minister and we literally lived next door, but because I was involved and wanted to be involved. Many of the youth of St. Paul's were involved in the church choir, Jesus Juveniles. We sang at our church and other churches, for charity events and church plays, and even went on tour. Growing up at St. Paul's was the best. However, our youth grew up, went off to college or their career, and most have not returned. This is the sad reality for the church these days, and it's not just happening at St. Paul's, it'shappening to many churches, especially smaller ones.

So, what can we do? How do we get more youth into our church? We should not be looking at the number of youths but how we can bring them to a church that continues supporting them. Not only do I remember the number of youths we had, but I also remember the helpers and volunteers we had. We had leaders; however, we also had parents, friends, and other congregation members help every step of the way. I was not a part of the youth group when Belinda took the youth on mission trips, but I know that it could not have come to life without the members of our church. People gave the youth their time, money, prayers, and support, and we do not have to stop.



A couple of weeks ago, the church welcomed our youth for our first Youth Sunday, which comprised young children. Our oldest child was 11, and our youngest was three. They did a fantastic job, and I am so proud of every one of them. We produced such a service because of all the help I have received from many members of our congregation. We did it together. We succeeded together. We spread the word of God together. However, we are just getting started. We have a young youth program right now, but we are so blessed. We are blessed to share Christ's love with them so early in life that we can build up our youth program again. But we cannot do it alone. We need help. We need your help. It is going to take a church to raise our Youth.







Pastor's Peace

"28 There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus." Galatians 3:28

This past February the Councils and ministry team leaders came together at MarLu Ridge for our annual Leadership Retreat. We were blessed to have Pastor Carla Christopher as our facilitator for the day. Pastor Carla serves as the Assistant to the Bishop for Justice Ministries. The focus of the presentation was to provide those in attendance a better understanding of the LGBTQIA+ community as there are many things that are confusing and things which many of us might not understand. I believe I am confident in saying that everyone who attended the retreat left with new knowledge and perhaps a better understanding of what it means to love our neighbor. Not that long after, I met up with Pastor Carla at a Frederick Conference Meeting where she was kind enough to share an experience she had at MarLu Ridge following our conversations at the leadership retreat.

Pastor Carla shared that when we had all left, the kitchen staff came out to greet her and shared their appreciation for the conversations that were had that day with our two councils and how pleased they were with what they termed as positive interactions in not only being willing to learn about this but to learn how to embrace others who may live on the fringes of society. Pastor Carla spent another two hours sharing life with these siblings in Christ to not only hear their stories, but to share with them the love of God we so greatly blessed to enjoy. Fast forward to June at Synod Assembly, and though not named specifically, Pastor Carla lifted up our two congregations as a model for what it is like to be willing to embrace those who are different from us and not to exclude anyone from our midst. Just knowing that together in Christ we have had a positive impact on the community and our Synod is pointing us in the right direction of simultaneously showing who we are as congregations and who we are as siblings in Christ.

Your Council is working to put knowledge in our toolboxes and that is all. Much like we discussed in our Gathered at the Table Series, we are providing information so you can be better prepared to love your neighbor no matter who it is. It is OK to disagree, but I would encourage you to keep seeking answers, find truths, and be willing to learn new things. Inclusion is not limited to this group or that group, inclusion means finding those who are the least, lost, and the last by welcoming them into our community of faith so that no one is left behind. When we are accepting of those who we feel might be different from us in some way, we are doing what Christ reminds us in Matthew 25:36-40:

³⁶I was naked and you clothed Me; I was sick and you visited Me; I was in prison and you came to Me.' ³⁷ "Then the righteous will answer Him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see You hungry and feed You, or thirsty and give You drink? ³⁸ When did we see You a stranger and take You in, or naked and clothe You? ³⁹ Or when did we see You sick, or in prison, and come to You?' ⁴⁰ And the King will answer and say to them, 'Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me.'

Dear Christ Church family and friends,

By now you have heard that there was a major fire that caused significant damage. Our shelter staff did an excellent job of evacuating the residents, and no one was hurt. In the midst of such chaos, what a joy to see an incredible partnership of our ministries working together. The CCHA staff and residents hosted our shelter residents, providing coffee, breakfast, and lunch for everyone. This evening all of our residents have been moved to a hotel.

Over 100 firefighters, EMS, BGE, and police have worked together to stabilize the fire, extinguish it, and clean up the high level of Carbon Monoxide.

The fire destroyed the major electrical room, which means we do not have power in the building until it is rebuilt. The rest of the building was affected by smoke, and we don't yet know the full extent of the damage. The cause of the fire is still unknown.

In the meantime, our worship services will be online this Sunday.

Thank you for your notes, calls, texts, and messages. Thanks to all who have been working on this so we can get back to our normal schedule. Many of you and friends from around the country have reached out asking how you can help. You can help by donating to the building cleanup and rebuilding fund. With your generosity, we can rebuild the electrical infrastructure soon and continue our ministries.

As the word of the Prophet reminds us: "When we pass through the waters, he will be with us; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm us; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume us." - Isaiah 43:2

Quilting Ministry

At Worship on Sunday, July 21, we will bless about 40 quilts.

Quilt Ministry, an offshoot of Congregational Life Ministry, is dedicated to making quilts for local charities. We specialize in quilts for children. These children, many displaced from home and some without a proper bed, have so little. They need a blanket to sleep under and something of their own to hold. These quilts provide warmth to the body and comfort to the soul, thereby fulfilling St. Paul's Mission Statement: Through Christ, we joyfully feed the body, mind and soul of all.

Historically, we have distributed quilts, mainly to four organizations:

- 1. Sleep in Heavenly Peace (a.k.a. "No kid sleeps on the floor")
- 2. Children of Incarcerated Parents
- 3. Heartly House
- 4. Faith House

We would like to lengthen that list. If you know of any reasonably local (for pick-up/delivery) organizations--or families who might be down on their luck--that might be interested in children's quilts, please contact Kate Stottlemyer or the Church Office. No child should go to sleep cold.
