



Lately we have been hearing a lot about wants and needs in our Gospel Lessons. There are many things we seek out as our wants in the world but are they things we really need. There have been a couple of items I have been looking at on Facebook Marketplace and some I have acquired because I liked it, it fit my personality, and it was a nice addition to our home. Other things like a still or shuffleboard table have been also up there as something that I wanted and have been very particular about certain components of these items. Is it the right size, is the board laid out the way I envision, how much is it? This past Thursday I found the shuffleboard table I thought would work and the distance I would have to travel to acquire it would not be that far. I made arrangements to meet the seller but during the night, I found myself really pondering whether I needed this or it was just something I wanted. I decided and after a conversation with Sue, really understood it was a want and not a need so I cancelled my meeting with the seller.

There are many things that we have as wants and needs in our church. We may want an updated kitchen and elevator so that we can work our meals ministry here in Walkersville. We may want different music or a change in our liturgy so that it matches what we are comfortable with or have done for many years. We may want a pastor who is not sarcastic and who does everything we want a pastor to do, as long as it fits in with our picture of the pastor. The list goes on and on but is this list what we need. We have been able to partner with Woodsboro Lutheran to have a meals ministry in our community and it has branched out to a neighboring area (Bell Court) which has made a significant impact in us serving our neighbor. The community is guaranteed a meal twice a month and for some that is a tremendous need. We are trying to grow in our worship and praise life in which we are trying different things, we are experiencing challenges but with each of these challenges, we have experienced our need to grow. As far as the sarcastic pastor, he tries and is continually making efforts to come beside you, provide loving care, meaningful messages, and an effort to give this community what it is seeking. Does he always fulfill that need, maybe not but that is where he is hopeful you will engage him in constructive assist conversation to in clearing up any misconceptions that might arise.

I believe it is important for us to realize what are our needs as opposed to our wants. This is where your Council comes in and to whom you should speak when you have ideas that might be beneficial in guiding our congregation forward. Our ultimate goal is to seek out our siblings in Christ to hear from them what their needsare, their needs are not for us to determine as we cannot know truly what someone else may need. We want to help, but we need to listen and we need to listen on many fronts. When we love our siblings we hear their needs and we are able to provide. When we love one another, we understand we are different yet are respectful in seeing each other as a child of God, serving a need and not a want. Ultimately, God serves all of our needs for he is our Good Shepherd and we shall not be in want.

If you are interested in volunteering your time on a Saturday in September or any Saturday through the end of 2024, please contact the Church Office.




