# **Pastor's Peace**

*"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope."* Romans 15:13

As we welcome the new year, we find ourselves at the intersection of reflection and anticipation. The calendar page turns, and with it comes a fresh opportunity to consider the blessings and challenges of the past, as well as the promise and possibility of the year ahead. We remember the new year is not simply a moment of personal resolve, but an opportunity to reflect on God's faithfulness and our call to live in the grace of our Savior, Jesus Christ. 
